On the Road: An Inward Journey

*A Lenten Reflection by Donald A. Wells,
Theologian in Residence*

As we make our way through Lent, the question is always there—whether we acknowledge its presence or not—who are we? As people of faith we can give all the right answers: a child of God; a disciple of Christ; one who bears the image of God; and on and on. All good answers, these. But Lent is a time when we should push further: who are we in the deep down places of our lives when the tough choices need to be made?

James Kugel, who taught religion at Harvard University for many years, speaks of a time in his life when, after being diagnosed with cancer, he was confronted by his ‘essential self.’ He suggests (*In the Valley of the Shadow: On the Foundations of Religious Belief*. Free Press, 2011) that there were moments when all of the background noises of life ceased and he was a solitary entity alone in a vast cosmos. The noises of infinite time stretching out before you with all of its possibilities, along with the cacophony of things that occupy us daily, all went silent. There he was, naked as it were, “one little person, sitting in the late summer sun with only a few things left to do.”

I believe Jesus had such an experience in the wilderness, the experience we deem as the rationale for Lent. He knew all of the right answers, as do we, as to identity: a child of God, and on and on. Indeed, he was raised in a Jewish home with the prayers and biblical affirmations that were so dear to his people. But the wilderness was something different. Deep down inside, when all of the background noises were gone: the crowds attending his Baptism; the excitement generated by being known as a rising young Galilean preacher; the adulation of John the Baptist—the question is still there, ‘who are you, Jesus?’

It is not just an affirmation of his ministry. He had that at his Baptism and it would unfold even more in the weeks ahead as he engaged in that ministry. Rather it is what I have been referring to as ‘a deep down question’—who are you, really?—a testing of those time-worn answers we all give so easily. He was tempted: turn stones into bread and demonstrate magical powers; assume power by questionable means and then you can do good; be a showman and throw yourself down from a mountain and gather a crowd (Luke 4:1-13). These things all worked in the first century and they certainly still work in the 21st century. Do whatever you need to do to get ahead and to further your own goals.

If you really want to press the imagery, Jesus had a ‘terminal illness’ that would give him just three years with execution at the end. If you teach and preach and live like he did, you are lucky to get three years! Professor Kugel was given 2-5 years. While the two are so very different, the question still remains—how will you live out the days of your life; the ones that are before you?

The circumstances of our lives certainly do not need to be as dramatic as were those of Jesus or Professor Kugel. I certainly hope not. But temptations abound and the question as to who we really are is still there. Jesus answered it for himself: no cheap tricks to advance the message of the Kingdom of God or to enhance his reputation. Holy Week was the capstone of that resolve. Professor Kugel has answered it in his commitment to do what is right before God in his remaining years (he has now lived seven years beyond his initial diagnosis).

Lent is a time for such questions. What does it mean to live out (or in) the Kingdom of God in our time when there are so many ways to fudge the answer? Will we live with integrity, courage and joy? Will we live into actions that will care for the marginalized, the refugee, and the immigrant? Will our voices be heard in protesting the further destruction of the earth? All of these things may cost us financially as well as in other ways. Inner journey. Deep down places. Lent. Jesus. You. Me. The stakes are high. ‘Come, follow me’ has consequences. Indeed it does.

HEARD IT *at* COUNCIL March 8, 2011

Council began a full evening by reflecting on the coming Lenten Season. Moderator Vard Johnson encouraged each Council member to say a few words about his or her hopes for Lent. Nancy followed this tender conversation with a prayer to help us prepare for Lent and she offered her thanksgiving for the life of an Old South friend, the Reverend Peter Gomes, who passed away on February 28.

Council approved several action items during this meeting. Paul Kuenstner, Chair of the Operations Committee, introduced a motion to hire an outside professional company to assess areas where renovations are needed within the church building. This motion was approved. In other news, the Health Department has approved the temporary use of Old South's facilities for the Women's Lunch Place (WLP). The WLP will cover the minimal costs needed to renovate the kitchen to meet Health Department standards. Council unanimously approved the motion for Old South to host the Women's Lunch Place this summer. Council voted to approve a search committee to hire a permanent Executive Assistant Minister, a part-time position eligible for ordination. The Search Committee consists of all Council Members-at-Large, and two Deacons, and is chaired by Senior Deacon Candace Kosturko.

Much of the Council meeting was spent discussing the next steps for actualizing Old South's Vision for the 21st Century. Debby Kuenstner, Chair of the Vision Working Group, introduced charters for three new implementation groups. These vision implementation groups revolve around the following themes: 1) Sanctuary in the City, 2) Christians in Formation, and 3) Faith at the Crossroads. Each of these groups will work with relevant standing committees to support the fulfillment of the Vision. Council will consider these charters more carefully over the coming month, and will consider their approval in April.

Nancy reported on superb financial news for Old South. By the end of the week, the MBTA is expected to provide the church with a check to cover what is needed to make the building whole again. Nancy offered some impressive data about congregational pledging. Congregational support is now projected to cover 51.3% of Old South's yearly total budget; a dramatic increase from the 36% offered by the Congregation in 2006. Nancy said that if financial generosity is a marker of spiritual maturity, than Old South is growing in spiritual maturity by the year.

Council wrapped up a full evening with a prayer for Old South's Vision and a joyful "Amen!"
