



## Encountering our city... living our FAITH AT THE CROSSROADS of the world



Samuel Adams, a member of Old South Church, once commented that “what the world requires of Christians is that they should continue to be Christians.” Here at Old South our Vision for the 21<sup>st</sup> Century calls upon us to deepen how we understand our Christian faith and witness by actively exploring “the intersections between science and religion, church and state, mind and body, history and the present.” To that end, the FAITH AT THE CROSSROADS Task Force presents two initiatives in January aimed at getting Old Southerners out and into our city—both to be Christians and to further shape how this congregation understands what it means to be Christian. Both will be led by our Theologian in Action, Rev. June Cooper.

In partnership with the Christian Service and Outreach Committee, we will once again join the Martin Luther King Day of Service and Learning sponsored by City Mission Society, an organization that Old South Church helped found and has partnered with since 1816. Old South’s fifth year of participation in this event will be augmented with new programming; read about it on page 5.

Then, in mid-January, Rev. Cooper will launch an exciting new program at Old South Church—The Urban Body of Christ. This program will engage participants in studying biblical depictions of the city, undertaking pilgrimages to places of suffering, reflecting on the opportunities for reconciliation and transformation, and the doing of peace and justice ministries in the city of Boston. As June reflects, “The God of our faith is expansive, mysterious, and sometimes confounding, beyond our complete understanding – but also inviting. Our work is designed to engage the congregation in asking real questions about the ways that God is moving in the city and enliven our response to God and our neighbors.” The Urban Body of Christ kicks off on Wednesday, January 25<sup>th</sup> with a four-week interactive course, “The City in Scripture”, that studies what the Bible says about the city *and* takes participants out into Boston to see how it applies. The second leg of the program, “Five Theological Foundations for Engaging Injustice in the City”, will commence after Easter. This, too, will include visits to various sites in Boston.

Rev. Cooper plans to enroll a core group of six people who will commit to participating in the entire 2012 Urban Body of Christ program. These six will be trained in how to teach and lead future iterations of the program. Each component of the program also will have up to six *additional* spaces for people who want to do a particular segment, but cannot commit to the full program. ## Introducing Interim Associate Minister John M. Edgerton



On December 13<sup>th</sup>, the Church Council accepted with enthusiasm the unanimous recommendation of the Interim Associate Minister Review Committee—Nick Carter (chair), Bill Adams, David Becker, Brigitte Fletcher, Erin Hull, Vard Johnson, and Jake Maliel—to hire John M. Edgerton to serve as our Interim Associate Minister.

A 2009 graduate of the University of Chicago Divinity School, John recently completed a two-year pastoral residency with the 1800-member Plymouth Congregational Church (UCC) in Minneapolis. His preaching, intellect and presence embody a maturity well beyond his years. He has also taught adult education, tended to pastoral care, and participated in mission trips to Sierra Leone. We know that the unique gifts of Quinn Caldwell cannot be replaced, but John is himself remarkably gifted and we are confident he will provide the sustaining excellence our church needs during the transition to new and permanent leadership.

In John’s own words: “I love to be a part of worship. Singing and breaking bread and reflecting on scripture, these are the rhythms of the church that remind me that I am part of something greater than myself. The clatter of coffee-cups, the strong press of a handshake, the shining eyes of someone holding back tears, these are like a great heartbeat that both sends people out into the world and draws them back into community week after week.”

John begins January 9<sup>th</sup>; his wife, Heather, will join him later in January or in February.

# *On the Road from the East: The Magi*

## A Reflection for Epiphany

The old stories, familiar because we have heard them many times over, still have much to teach us. Alas, however, because of their very familiarity we can often miss what they have to say.

The journey of the Magi, those enigmatic, shadowy figures ‘from the East,’ briefly occupying our attention at Christmas (mentioned only in Matthew 2:1-19), and providing inspiration for several carols, is a case in point. These Magi, whether they were philosophers, astronomers, astrologers or simply curiosity seekers—we do not know—followed a star that shone brightly in the sky; a star portending great things.

No one can vouch for the historicity of stories like these. Written some 75-85 years after the birth of Jesus, there were no eyewitnesses to verify this journey. But truth does not lie in historical fact alone. Truth is broader, often more complex, and sometimes filled with great surprise. It’s often encased in metaphor, in myth, in tales that excite the heart and compel the mind. In our scientific age, truth can often be a causality of the facts.

We really have no idea as to the motivating factors that led to the creation of this particular story. Various scenarios present themselves. The authors had seen Jesus reach out to those beyond their own religious community so they wanted ‘outsiders’, as it were, part of the story from the beginning. Or, the early Christian movement, facing tensions with the Roman Empire whose ruler was called ‘Lord’ and ‘King’, wanted to be sure Jesus was seen, from the very beginning, as one who inaugurated a different kind of kingdom; a kingdom of inclusion, compassion and justice. So ‘wise men’ came to pay homage to a different kind of king. Or perhaps it was the notion of journey – that to follow this Jesus you needed to embark on a journey following a star, if you will; a journey that the disciples were slowly beginning to understand. Journey?

Jesus beckoned James and John to leave their fishing nets and follow. The Samaritan woman walked to a well and it changed her life. After Zachaeus had lunch with Jesus, his journey began with making restitution to all those he had swindled. Mathew left his tax booth and signed on while Mary, Martha’s sister, began her journey listening carefully to his teachings.

Indeed, journeys come in all shapes and sizes depending on where we are and the next steps we need to take on our path of discipleship. Christine Rodgers’ poem, *Song on the Feast of the Epiphany*, says it well.

# HEARD IT *at* COUNCIL

December 13, 2011



The December Council meeting began on a tender note as members expressed their warm wishes for departing Associate Minister Quinn Caldwell through poetry, Bible passages, songs, and quotes from literature. Council members read to Quinn pieces by Billy Collins, Maya Angelou, Wendell Berry, Tolkien, and passages from Genesis and Jeremiah.

The discussion then turned to the hiring of an Interim Associate Minister. Search Committee chair Nick Carter presented Council with a glowing report on candidate John Edgerton. John comes to us from a two-year pastoral residency program at the Plymouth Congregational Church in Minneapolis. Nick described the Search Committee's meeting with John as "magical;" it was a challenge to identify potential areas of weakness. John's many strengths include preaching and pastoral care. The Senior Pastor from Plymouth Congregational reports that the congregation misses John terribly since his residency ended. Given this report, it did not take Council long to unanimously approve the motion to hire John as Old South's Interim Associate Minister. (see page 2)

The Leadership Committee is already looking ahead to the hiring of a permanent Associate Minister and Minister for Discipleship. Karen Hand, who will serve as chair of the Search Committee to fill both of these positions, put out a call for nominations of committee members. She has already received many thoughtful nominations, and the Leadership Committee will present a proposed slate of members at the next Council meeting

In other news, Stewardship Chair Kurt Gaertner expressed his gratitude to the Old South Congregation for their financial support. He noted that the median pledge amount has been climbing over the past few years. The Stewardship Committee expects additional pledges to come in by January 1<sup>st</sup>.

As the meeting drew to a close, Nancy presented words of extravagant praise and thanksgiving for Quinn's ministry. She wrote: "You are a fabulous and fair colleague, a thoughtfully prepared minister, and a *riveting* preacher." After hearing these words, Council sang Quinn a song from Roy Rogers: "Happy Trails to You."

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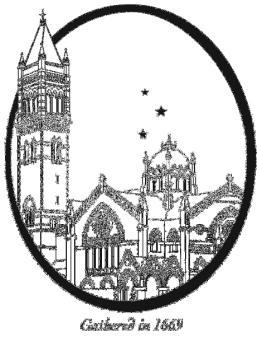
