Notes on Today's Music from MITCHELL CRAWFORD

Music at Festival Worship today surveys just a handful of the over 8,000 (!) hymns composed by American author Fanny Crosby. Crosby is a fascinating individual whose proverbial "greatest hits" are widely known and beloved, but whose prose — intertwined with an enthusiastic embrace of salvation doctrine — can sometimes be difficult to square with progressive theology and the desire of congregations like Old South for inclusion and

welcome. This is unfortunate, for it clouds the ways in which Crosby promoted social justice and the notion that God's surpassing love is meant for *all*, without exception.

Take, for example, the exuberant hymn of praise **To God Be the Glory**, sung today. Already in the first verse, Crosby inundates us with masculine images of God; not only is it all *he* and *his*, but the design of the poetry seems intended to maximize the occurrence of these pronouns. Yet, at a foundational level, this hymn speaks of the relationship between Jesus and the God he called *Abba* — Father. Likewise, we can be distracted by the characterization of Jesus's sacrificial death as 'an atonement for sin' and miss the impact of that sacrifice: 'and opened the life-gate that *all* may go in.'

Another verse, here omitted, speaks of redemption in a manner which, once again, can cause us to miss Crosby's overarching message. She writes, "O perfect redemption, the purchase of blood, to every believer the promise of God; the vilest offender who truly believes, that moment from Jesus a pardon receives." I won't lie: it can be hard to get past the bloody purchase and *vilest offender*. Nevertheless, embedded within this unsparing language is truth: first, "to every believer the promise of God,' and second, this idea that no act — no matter how reprehensible — can cause God to rescind from us God's grace.

To better understand these seeming incongruities, it seems necessary, then, to place Crosby's life and work within their historical and cultural contexts. Born in Brewster, New York in 1820, Crosby would live to be nearly 95 old. Though blind essentially from birth, she became an ardent mission worker, activity that undoubtedly encouraged the outpouring of poetry that flowed from her pen. (Keen observers will note in *The New Century Hymnal* that **Blessed Assurance** was written on the spot after hearing the composer play the tune on the piano. Wow!) Despite the unimaginable success Crosby had as an author (an estimated 100 million books containing her lyrics were sold *in her lifetime*), her self-professed vocation was always that of city mission worker, and both **Pass Me Not, O Gentle Savior** (1868) and **Rescue the Perishing** (1869) emerged from her involvement in urban ministry. For decades, Crosby lived and worked in the most vulnerable parts of Manhattan, serving immigrant communities as well as the urban poor. She denounced the "horror of wealth," and devoted the income generated by her hymns and songs to the needy.

Given her obvious commitments to social justice and service to the needy, it is important to separate the intent of Crosby's prose from the religious vernacular with which it elides. Indeed, one might say Crosby used the prevailing religious-poetic style of the day to espouse a theology that was by other measures ahead of its time. As a woman in a highly patriarchal society, she likewise exploited every avenue available to her to move those whose attitudes toward the foreigner and the poor were much less charitable than her own. And while the language of her hymns perhaps no longer represents where we are (theologically speaking), it is a valuable reminder of where we've been, and what barriers there remain to traverse.
