n.b.: The melody of this chorale — variously altered — is woven by Brahms into the fabric of the first two movements of the Requiem. Though obvious to Brahms, the allusion was perhaps less evident to his audiences: responding to one inquisitor on the subject, Brahms is recorded having said "if you can't hear it, it doesn't matter much. In the first bars and in the second movement you can find it. It is a well-known chorale."

NOTES ON TODAY'S MUSIC

The *German Requiem* made Brahms's international name. Previously known to a limited audience as an often problematic successor of Schumann in his extended piano and chamber works, he gained an entirely new audience, and earned comparison with Bach and Beethoven. Though long considered a major challenge to performers, the work quickly established itself in the repertory and has held a secure place ever since, despite changing fashions in choral music through the twentieth century. Nonetheless, it came to be associated with a certain stolidity and worthiness. Only of recent years has there been a fresh realization of its individuality of text and structure, as well as its sheer beauty of sound and line, first with the investigations of historical and stylistic scholarship, and latterly with the attention of performers using the forces and playing styles of the period. The individuality of the *Requiem* emerges from its history: in its links to the distant past and its unusual text, and the structural mastery demonstrated by the way this text and the musical ideas are balanced and integrated.

In transferring Brahms's immense *Requiem* from concert hall to church, it has been necessary to adopt an accompaniment scaled to the latter. This morning's performance presents the *German Requiem* in an instrumental adaptation by Heinrich Poos, dating from 1978. Poos reduces the large instrumentation of the original to just two pianos and timpani; nevertheless, the adaptation is a highly successful reconfiguration of the material — one which lends a chamber quality to the whole, and naturally enhances the prominence of the choral forces within the musical texture. Finally, a word about the omission of the 7th movement. Devotees of the *Requiem*, familiar with performances in concert and other settings, will likely miss this concluding summation, full as it is of tender words and music. To be clear, this is a sentiment I share; the *Requiem* is a towering work of immense genius, and any omission is regrettable. That said, today's performance fits the score to practical use within the specific context of a worship service; as such, our conclusion with the rapturous 6th movement serves both as thrilling capstone to the work, and moves us toward the *Alleluias* which close our time together this All Saints' Sunday.


ALL-CHURCH CHECK-IN
