

## Notes on Today's Music from MITCHELL CRAWFORD

The music for our 350th Anniversary worship service has been chosen to highlight specific aspects of our superlative, eclectic music ministry.

William Billings (1746–1800) is considered the father of American choral music, having self-published over the course of his life an astounding six volumes of hymns, anthems, psalms, and fuging tunes. Born in Boston, Billings was a tanner by trade — he had no formal training in music. His association with Old South likely began in 1769, when a public announcement in the *Boston Gazette* of October 2nd appeared declaring, "John Barrey & William Billings Begs Leave to inform the

Publick, that they propose to open a singing school THIS NIGHT, near the Old South Meeting-House, where any Person inclining to learn to Sing may be attended upon at said School with Fidelity and Dispatch." Despite the popularity his music achieved during the decades that followed, Billings's financial position was often precarious. He died in poverty, leaving a widow and six children behind. A memorial plaque at the Central Burying Ground of the Boston Common honors his legacy; its dedication reads, "One of America's earliest native born composers who greatly enhanced a musical awareness within the colonies by respected tradition, his final resting place is believed to be an unmarked grave within this area of the common."

I selected **Raymond Wise**'s Gospel-hued arrangement of the traditional Ghanian song, *Daa Naa Se*, to highlight Old South's wide embrace of music and worship traditions from around the globe. Wise arranged the piece for the African American Choral Ensemble of Indiana University, where he taught at the time. As he relates, 'I had the privilege of having a graduate student from Ghana who shared this folk song with the African American Choral Ensemble that I conducted. Having heard this song and seen the student's excitement toward the song, I was inspired to arrange a choral version that could be performed by the choir as a processional for our spring concert." A variety of percussive elements give the music a lively, authentic feel, as does the incorporation of the original twi language (twi, Ghana's official 'second language,' is spoken by some 95 percent of Ghanians).

The setting of Psalm 122 by American composer **Leo Sowerby** (1895–1968) is, to this writer, among the more remarkable sacred choral anthems of the 20th century. Born in Grand Rapids, Sowerby began composing at the age of ten before beginning formal study at the American Conservatory of Music in Chicago. He found early success with his Violin Concerto, which was premiered by the Chicago Symphony in 1913. In 1921, he became the first composer to receive the American Prix de Rome; he would later be awarded the Pulitzer Prize for Music for his cantata, *Canticle of the Sun.* Sowerby was associated with a number of prominent churches during his career — he held positions at Fourth Presbyterian Church, Chicago and St. James Cathedral [Chicago], as well as at the National Cathedral in Washington, DC. His music is an amalgam of brash American angularity, jazz-inflected harmonies, and sensual (!) melody. These qualities are amply on display in the setting of Psalm 122, which, in addition, incorporates an accompaniment for organ of quite similar disposition to our own storied E. M. Skinner Op. 308.

#### GARAGE PARKING VALIDATIONS

We have arrangements for discounted parking with two nearby garages for Old South Church worship or church business (excluding weddings and concerts):

- 1. Park at the **Garage @ 100 Clarendon** (behind Back Bay Station), have your ticket validated at our Front Desk, and **you** pay the discounted rate of \$7 for up to 3 hours. Old South bears no cost.
- 2. Park at the **Prudential Garage** for up to 5 hours on Saturday or Sunday, have your ticket validated at our Front Desk, and the Prudential Garage will bill **Old South** (costing us \$15k \$20k per year).
