A Healing Day: Marking 400 Years of African American Culture and History

On August 25, 1619 some "20 and odd" Africans aboard the White Lion were unloaded at Old Point Comfort in Hampton, Virginia and sold into slavery. The enslaved persons were skilled farmers, herders, blacksmiths and artisans. Along with their skills, they brought their own culture, language and beliefs that shaped innovations in food production, crop cultivation, music and dance.

Communities and Houses of Faith across the nation are urged to pause and mark this anniversary by sharing stories about the integral role that African Americans have played in the history of the Nation over the past 400 years. In addition, at 3pm this afternoon, Old South Church will join with others across the country to pause and ring our bell for four minutes (one for each century) and to share in telling the stories of African Americans.

*THE MIDDLE PASSAGE (THE MAAFA) June R. Cooper One: Eternal God, our Creator, the descendants of earth's firstborn ancestors come to you in remembrance of tragic death.
All: We have often spoken and acted in ignorance of our history, but today we remember the sufferings of the past. We grieve for those who made the long transatlantic crossing on slave

- One: We remember those dark-hued kings and queens, chiefs and warriors who were stolen, shackled, and sold from African soil and kindred.
- All: In the Middle Passage from Africa to the New World, they traveled cramped in spaces too small for them to turn.

- One: We remember those who died from exhaustion, and cruel conditions; we remember those who were killed for their resistance.
- All: We remember our brothers and sisters whose bodies were beaten, broken and violated. We remember our sisters who bore their young, only to be torn from them. We remember those who found freedom's final rest hanging from a tree. May we never see this sort of atrocity again.
- One: We remember the cries of children whose tears were never comforted, and whose hearts were never warmed by the embrace of their mothers and fathers; and who were afflicted with the diseases of their oppressors.
- All: Africa, our Africa, we may never have known you, but our faces are full of your blood. We, your children, cry, "God, have mercy." May the world never see this atrocity again.
- One: May faith in Christ sustain us as we forgive the trespassers of the past.
- All: We vow to remember and to honor the resistance and endurance of our ancestors. We thank you, God, for bringing us to freedom and for showing us the pathway to hope. – African American Heritage Hymnal

OFFERTORY The Drinking Gourd André J. Thomas, arr. "The Drinking Gourd" is a map song used by Underground Railroad operatives to disseminate escape instructions. The many 'sing posts' encoded in the text enabled fleeing slaves to make their way north along the Ohio River to freedom. Taken at face value, the "drinking gourd" refers to the hollowed-out gourd used by slaves (and other rural Americans) as a water dipper. But here it is used as a code name for the Big Dipper star formation, which points to Polaris, the North Star.
